Whoever said "you can't go home again" wasn't from Johnston City! Five classes from JCHS found a place to relive high school memories beside a remarkable reproduction of the entrance to their old school building, demolished in 1997 to make room for the current high school. ### Andresen's Cafe: local food with side of history

Andresen's Café and Event Center owner Anthony Spiller offers great food and décor in a nearly 100-year old restaurant. His family has owned the local landmark on Broadway for more than 50 years.  
"My grandmother worked here for 48 years," Spiller said. "She bought the restaurant in 1976 and I was pretty much raised here. She had a little mop and broom cut off for my height, and I worked beside her."  
Guests eat in the same mahogany booths installed when the restaurant opened in 1927. "These booths were manufactured in Chicago

and brought here by train," Spiller said. "These are the originals."  
Guests visiting Andresen's Event Center may dine in the courtyard beside the mammoth limestone columns which once framed the front doors of Johnston City's old high school building. Spiller used the columns to recreate the high school's facade on the event center patio. According to Spiller, "Country singer, Doug Supernaw, took the columns as payment for giving a concert at the high school in 1997. The columns were on his mother's farm until coming here."

Spiller discovered the high school's original blueprints in the Stotlar Lumber building. He has framed them and hopes to display them someday in a museum he plans to open on the second floor of the event center.  
The event center has room for 64 guests and the patio seats 120. Spiller said fried chicken and bacon wrapped tenderloin are favorites for catered events. The cafe serves fried chicken and chicken and dumplings every Sunday and is open daily from 6 am to 2 pm and remains open until 8 pm Wednesday through Friday.

### JC Sports Hall of Fame to honor 5 new inductees

### Attorney returns home in style

Johnston City native and attorney Meagan Rich has restored a building on East Broadway to its antique charm in order to practice law in her hometown.  
"This building was formerly the home of Mimmo's Pizza," Rich said. "That's where we'd always go for pizza after the game. I bought the building about a year ago and completely gutted and renovated it. We tried to take it back to the original as much as possible."  
Rich restored the building's original brick walls, decorative metal ceiling coverings, and two skylights. "It was unusual for buildings of this era to have skylights, but this one had two," Rich said. Andresen's Café owner Anthony Spiller assisted Rich in designing the office, including converting an antique organ once played in Johnston City into a desk.  
Rich, a 1997 graduate of JCHS, formerly practiced in Marion. She'll continue to practice family law and

serve as a public defender in the juvenile court from her new location.  
Rich said besides her family, former JCHS math teacher Ron Nagrodski had the greatest influence on her career choice. "He taught math but he taught so much more," Rich said. "He taught hard work, focus, and that if you put your mind to something you can always achieve it. His influence made me think I could actually be an attorney if I tried."  
The attorney is designing a special backdrop in her office where free photos will be made for JCHS students attending the school's homecoming dance October 14. Rich is a supporter of Johnston City athletics, the Manna Mission food pantry, and the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) in Williamson County.  
Rich will hold a ribbon cutting at her office immediately following the JCHS homecoming parade, Friday, October 13.

**Drive-thru Community Meals Begin October 7**

JCity's weekly Saturday evening meals will resume October 7, from 5:30-6:00 pm. This free, drive-through service provides a hot and ready-to-eat option for anyone in the community. Meals are first come, first serve, as quantities may be limited; however, no meals will be served before 5:30.

JCity Church sponsors this effort, with generous support and volunteer help from other local churches, food pantries, private donation, civic organizations, and school groups. "We truly want to make this a community effort," meal organizers agree.

The church began offering these weekly meals in 2020, during the height of COVID, when many restau-

rants were closed, leaving some individuals without food on weekends, as senior services and/or schools primarily focused on weekdays meals. During that time, the small group of volunteers chose a 12 noon to 2 pm. pick-up to accommodate needs, serving up as many as 150 plates on a single Saturday. However, as COVID waned, the group shortened its weekly time window to 30 minutes in the evening. The effort has continued since that time, with weekly meal counts averaging between 50-60 during 2022 and 2023.

The group took a hiatus in late May 2023, as many of its volunteers also serve in JC Kids' Lunch Bunch. For the past 14 years, this en-

during summer meals program has provided weekday hot meals to both children and adults in the community during the months of June and July. Unlike established food pantries within the community, both the Saturday meal and the Lunch Bunch offer fully prepared meals.

"We're ready to come back," says volunteer Barb Buckner, who views this weekly commitment as both an opportunity to serve the community and find personal fulfillment and camaraderie amongst

volunteers. "We all work together," she adds, with each person doing what he or she enjoys—cooking, prepping, washing dishes, or delivering meals out to the cars.

Community response has been positive. "I sure appreciate them," states recipient Louise Hoffard. "Life gets hectic," says Phil Crosby, who has been both a recipient and a volunteer. "This program is a bright spot in the community... people who are trying to make a difference." Some individuals regularly pick up meals for others who are elderly, homebound, or lack transportation. Volunteer Marta Phillips sums up the

group's motivation. "God keeps abundantly providing the food, and we just want to share these blessings with others."

JCity Church welcomes resources and volunteers, including groups (businesses, community organizations, or churches) who would cook, serve, or sponsor a meal. Interested individuals or groups, may contact organizers through JCity Church at 618-983-5254; or through the JCity Center at 618-952-1272.
