4 Arrowhead Campground reopens

Arrowhead Campground, 1600 Peterson, will reopen March 15. The campground offers 65 RV sites with water and electric hookups (30/50 amp). The standard rate for RVs and trailers is \$22 per night. Discounts are available for veterans, seniors, and campers staying more than 7 days. Two camper cabins may be rented for \$42 or \$60 per night (\$50 deposit required). Tent sites cost \$12 per night, are limited to a 7-night stay, and must be reserved directly with the camp office (tent camping reservations may not be made online).

According to City Councilman Dwight Hoffard, the campground is totally booked for the upcoming solar eclipse, April 5-8. Campers desiring to be placed on a waiting list should note that standard fees do not apply during that time. If any sites do become available, RVs will be charged \$50 per night (\$25 for tents). No discounts will be permitted during the eclipse event.

Easter egg hunt promises fun for kids

Two local banks will team up with the City to provide a fun Easter egg hunt for children on Saturday, March 30, according to Johnston City Clerk Jade West. The free event begins at 1:00 pm at the Arrowhead Ball Field.

"We will have an Easter Bunny, face painting, and plenty of eggs to go around for all ages," West adds. Banterra Bank will provide toy and gift card prize baskets to the child in each age group who finds the egg with the prize ticket. Legence Bank will provide some of the hidden candy-stuffed eggs.

The event will include separate hunts for the following age groups: children 3 and under; ages 4-6; ages 7-9; and ages 10-12. Groups will hunt at different times, enabling parents with more than one child to accompany participants. "We'll have a DJ who will announce each



age level," West assures.

Coordinated by City Hall since 2021, the hunt is a growing annual attraction. Last year's hunt drew 200

Emergency medical help as close as fire station

Emergency medical help is as close as the Johnston City Fire Station at 500 Washington Avenue.

"If you call 911, the system will call the Johnston City Fire Department, so we can get on the scene before the ambulance arrives," said Johnston City Fire Chief Tom Burton. "We [every firefighter] can do CPR, stop bleeding, and put people on oxygen."

United EMS provides Johnston City ambulance service from its bases in Marion and Herrin.

Burton said the firefight-

JCity Center workshop helps students discover art can be fun, relaxing

JCity Center for Hope and Renewal recently hosted a four-week Art for Fun and Relaxation workshop. This free weekly program (January 23-February 13) gave kids in third through fifth grade opportunities to express their creativity through paints, markers, and other colorful art supplies.

Johnston City resident, Marta Phillips, designed and led the hour-long sessions. With an extensive history of working with JC youth as a parent, school program volunteer, children's ministry director at her church, and program coordinator of JC Kids Lunch Bunch, Marta affirms her love for kids and her love of working with them. She says of this passion, "Because that's just what God called me to do. And when God calls you to do that, and gives you that want in your heart, then that's what your happiest doing."

The art workshop, now in its second year at JCity Center, offers kids a place to have fun and relax. It gives them a safe space, "showing them the best side of life," Marta aspires. "We deal with some kids who come from environments that are less than perfect. And I just thought in my heart that we needed to get the kids in here and give them something happy to do; something that . . . [places] no expectations on them."

A typical session might begin with the question, "If your day was a color, what color was your day?" —allowing children to express emotions as well as process the day's events using that color. Marta shares that in these last sessions, "We just strictly went with different art mediums. We did some acrylic paint; we did some watercolor paint; we did some chalk pastels; we did markers;—anything that had color."

Marta reflected on one of her favorite moments. "I had a child tell me, 'I just can't do this.' We were doing a workshop on *in the style of* and that just was not her style. She tried and she just looked at me and she said, 'I just can't do this.' And that was such a moment for me to be able to . . . say, 'That's okay. Just because we're trying to do [it] this particular way, that doesn't mean it's for you. It's okay if that's not what you're called to do. You do your style of art.'"

While the program certainly has educational value in learning the styles of various artists and qualities of different art mediums, Marta says she doesn't like to think of it as a class. "It's more of a workshop, because I want them to do what's comfortable for them. I want them to come in; I want them to relax, have some fun, maybe learn a couple of things,

and say, 'You know what? For this hour it was good. It was a good, good time for this particular hour.'"

The Center is planning a similar program in April

Billy Graham said, "God proved His love on the cross. When Christ hung and bled and died, it was God saying to the world, 'I love you.'"

With Easter fast approaching, let's take a moment to remember there is hope. Jesus still saves sinners. We look to the cross of Christ, but also, to the two crosses that hung next to Jesus. For reference, read Luke 23:32-43.

In Matthew's account of this event, both criminals initially insulted Jesus. Eventually, the one had a change of heart. Maybe, he was moved when Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Maybe, he read the sign above Jesus that said, "The King of the Jews." Maybe, it was simply being in the presence of Jesus. Something about the moment stirred his heart. How long does it take a person to

place faith in Jesus? It only takes a moment. A person must be sincere, but it takes only a moment.

We know very little about these criminals. We don't know their names or their hometowns. We don't know if they ever heard a word that Jesus taught or saw a single miracle. Were they religious? Did they read Scriptures? Did they attend worship services? We don't know. They are simply described as criminals or thieves. Crucifixion, in that day, was reserved for the worst of criminals; so, it's likely safe to say that they did more than steal a loaf of bread at the market. The word for criminals in the Greek implies violence as well. The one man understood: "We are getting what our deeds deserve." His was a humble confession. He understood his guilt and the innocence of Jesus. Then he made a request: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

Jesus replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with

me in paradise."

Consider these observations. Notice the word today. This man's salvation was immediate. He serves as a perfect example that it is never too late to turn to Jesus, and that even the worst of people can be forgiven. This man's story reveals that salvation is simple. He simply called out to the Lord and was saved. The Gospel is that Jesus is alive today, and He offers new and everlasting life. "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved" (Romans 10:13).

stored on board Johnston City's spotless fire trucks parked in an equally spotless fire station.

The department provides eight to ten hours training every week to its staff and volunteers. "The training covers everything from history of the fire service, to how to put on and take off an air tank, to forcible entry," Burton said.

Eighty percent of Johnston City fire calls are medical emergencies, Burton said. One firefighter is currently in paramedic

training and two are studying to become Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT). All Johnston City firefighters are trained Emergency Medical Responders (one level below EMT), a prerequisite for joining the department. Burton said the department's long-range goal of having its own ambulance will depend on a great deal of public help.

Johnston City gives and receives mutual aid from Marion, Herrin, West Frankfort, Zeigler, and Benton Fire Departments.

Young people age 15-21 are eligible to join the department's cadet training. "It's getting hard to find volunteers," Burton said. "It's good to start recruiting young people."

Chief Burton has been with the department nearly 44 years. He joined the cadets as a teenager around 1978. He became a volunteer in 1980, a full-time firefighter in 1987, and was appointed chief in 2010. The department hired Wayne Rice as assistant fire chief in 2023. "Rice was a volunteer for seven years," Burton said. "He's in school now getting lots of training so he'll be able to take over if I retire someday."

At the screening, children will participate in a "game-like" activity to measure development and growth, hearing, vision, and speech. Professionals from area early childhood programs will be available to answer questions.

A parent or guardian must attend with the child and should bring the following documentation: copy of the child's Certified Birth Certificate, im-

munization record, current physical examination report, proof of income, and proof of residency. Pre-K students currently enrolled need not attend.

Organizers encourage all families with children from birth to age five to attend, regardless of income.

If a family is unable to attend this screening, they may schedule an appointment at another location.



Dean advises vocal fans to join refs for best view of the game

From broadcasting, to officiating, to watching my kids participate, I have been around grade school, high school, and college sports all my life.

As I do, one thing over the years has not changed. That is the “passion” (for lack of a better word) people have for the games.

When kids play, parents tend to become an exten-

sion from the stands and voice their displeasure at either the officials or the coach. This is noticeable at almost all the games I’ve attended. And, as long as the person doesn’t get vulgar

or personal, it’s usually accepted as “just being a parent in the stands.”

Lately though, things are starting to rise to another level. It’s not only the parents, but fans in general, who are displaying their attitudes and opinions. In some areas of the country, games have been stopped because of things being thrown on the court or field. Instances of fans coming out onto the court have also crept up, even in our area.

Still, some good lines from fans can be heard during the games—some funny, and some maybe over the top.

One college band was asked to stop playing “Three Blind Mice” when the refs entered the arena. Another fan commented, “Vision Center opens at nine.” “We have a rope, we have a tree; all we need is a referee,” was heard at Centralia this year. That one might be a little over the top.

My favorite was at the Murray State/SIU game at Murray earlier this season. I was on press row located on the floor, and a very passionate Murray fan was on the first row of chair seats directly behind me. He called one of the referees, “Mr. Mago,” the entire night; and most of the time this fan wasn’t more than 20 feet from the guy.

Officials and umpires are often so focused on the game, they don’t even hear the stuff coming from the stands.

My philosophy is, as long as you don’t get personal, or vulgar, have at it. Some fans are very knowledgeable of the game, and some don’t know the difference between a free throw and a three-point basket.

At the grade school, high school and even at the college level, it is still considered a game, folks, and the sun will still come up the next day—win or lose. At the NBA level, I might agree that fans can loosen up and be a little more vocal when the people they are calling out are making money with a lot of zeros on the end.

My advice to all is this. If you want to make a little extra money, stay in shape and have the best view of the game; spend \$50 and get your license to call the game.

Then you may also find that the view is a little different from the bleachers to the floor.
